Corso Multisala highlights the collaborative energy and freewheeling dynamic of a group of tight-knit emerging artists, mainly based in Switzerland, who exhibit, curate and publish together. The exhibition is generated with the artists, who have also invited a number of participants from other countries and generations.

Corso Multisala is at once an exhibition and a performance space, and presents a landscape of make-shift and movable architectural structures, scattered with musical instruments. These stage sets are being activated and changed throughout the exhibition, in a wide-ranging programme that includes a major participatory music piece by Hannah Weinberger. As such a result the artworks in *Corso Multisala* are in a constant negotiation, oscillating from taking centre stage to becoming screens or backdrops for other pieces or performances.

The diverse and changing rhythm of the exhibition is also reflected in its psychedelic design, which is characterised by a constant play of colour, pattern and dots. It also features the appropriation of iconic imagery – be it analogue or digital – that is a part of the anti-authoritarian 'sharing' that thrives among the group. This spirit of exchange that is manifested in many works, including the videos by Cédric Eisenring and Thomas Julier and the rhythmically repetitive paintings by of Thomas Sauter and Emil Michael Klein.

The shared interests of the young Swiss artists are also reflected in the other collaborating artists that they have invited to join them. The grand scenographic installations of John Armleder (CH) have been a major influence, and the artist is represented by two large-scale patterned wall paintings. Other highlights include a selection from a unique graphic score by Cornelius Cardew (UK), screen-like fabrics by Adele Röder (DE), and fanzine prints by Jean-Michel Wicker (FR).

Performance of graphic scores by Cardew and others

Friday 20.05, 23.30 – 01.00

The programme for the evening is inspired by the role of graphic scores within experimental music. Drawings by Cédric Eisenring and Tobias Madison will be played (on marimba) by the artists, together with the Swiss musician Oliver Falk. Midnight will see a performance of *The Great Learning – Paragraph 2* (1971), one of the most famous compositions by the British avant-garde composer Cornelius Cardew. The latter performance will be staged by a big ensemble and is part of the project *Rio Bravo Serves Imperialism*. (See www.riobravo.eu).

The evening opens with one of the characteristic and playful dance performances by Swiss artist Vittorio Brodmann. In the second performance Oliver Falk and Paolo Thorsen-Nagel will create the soundscapes for a silent movie piece with their sonic and noisy guitar universe.
